Nouns Are the Centre



A noun names a person, place, thing or idea

person — scientist, ranger, student

place — museum, jungle, observatory

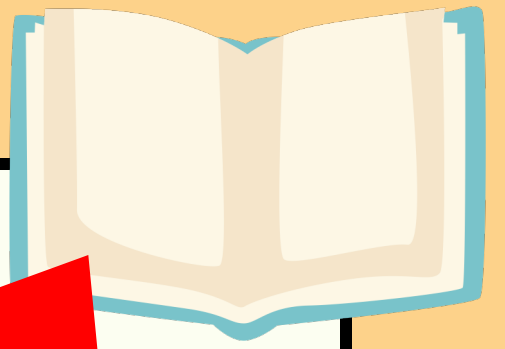
thing — key, robot, pathway

idea — curiosity, friendship

In a noun group, the noun that carries the main meaning is the head noun.



What Is a Noun Group?



A noun group is a group of words built around a head noun.

Example: those three curious red forest scientists

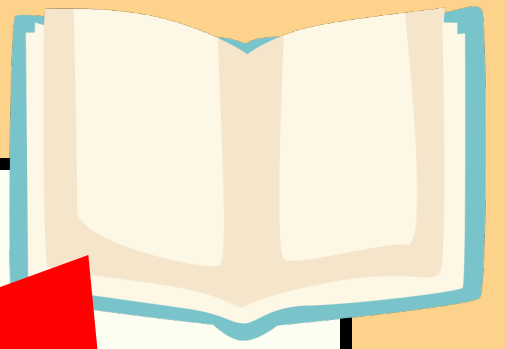
Head noun: scientists

The other words point, count, describe, or classify.

A noun group may be as short or as long as needed. Every word should help the reader.



Why Expand a Noun?



Vague: The birds landed.

Precise: Those three noisy crows landed.

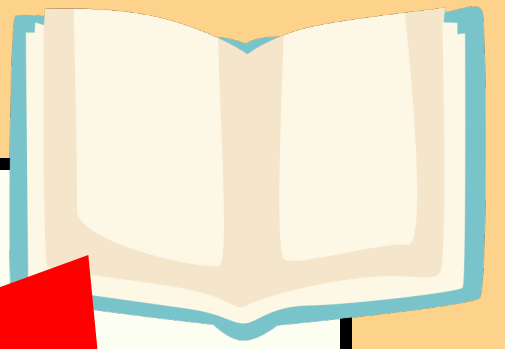

Precise noun groups help a reader picture the exact meaning.



The Build Order



Pointer or article — which one? this, the, an, a

Quantifier — how many? two, several, many, few

Describer — what is it like? curious, silly, enormous

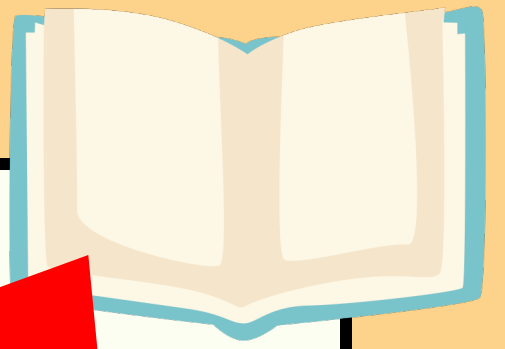
Class — what type? science, rainforest, rescue

Find noun — who or what? students, pathway, dog

But every noun group needs every part.



Pointers and Articles



Pointers and articles come before the head noun.

a or an — one, not yet specific

the — a particular one already known

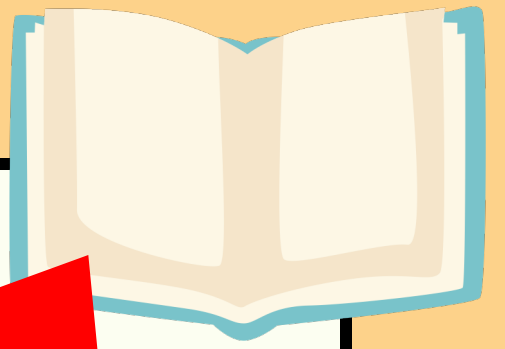
this or that — one nearer or farther away

the one or the other — more or less

compare a key — the key → that tiny silver key



Quantifiers



A quantifier tells how many or how much.

exact: two, six, both

non-exact: several, any, some, enough

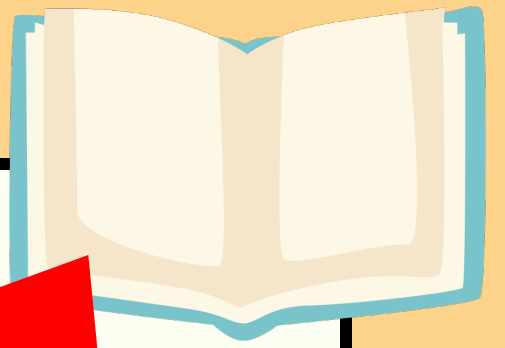
Keep meaning in mind.

Example: There are three hikers.

Interpretation: those three many hikers



Descriptors



Descriptors add qualities such as size, colour, age, condition or behaviour.

a patient mentor

the rough winter weather

those forgetful students

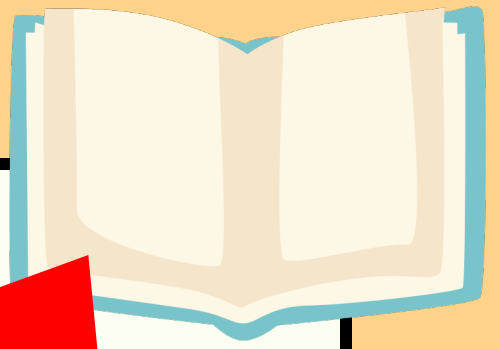
Aid me with ideas. I have a little tiny mouse.

A strong revision is the tiny mouse.

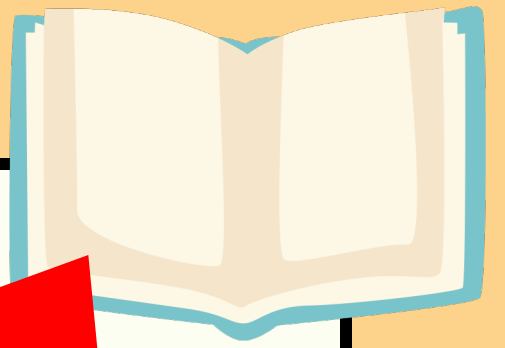


Classifiers

A classifier shows the type or category of the head noun.
science students — students of a particular subject
rescue dog — a dog with a particular role
mountain path — a path in a particular setting
vegetable soup — because of a particular purpose
Classifiers usually sit close to the head noun.

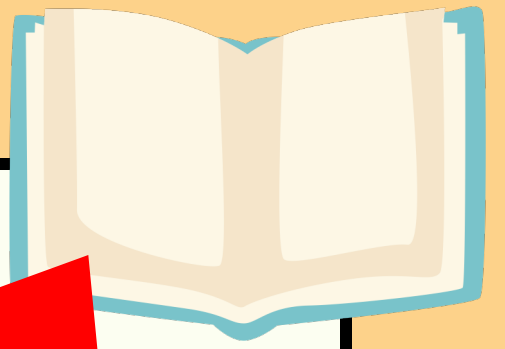

Build for Precision



Start with the head noun: birds

Point: those birds

Count: those three birds

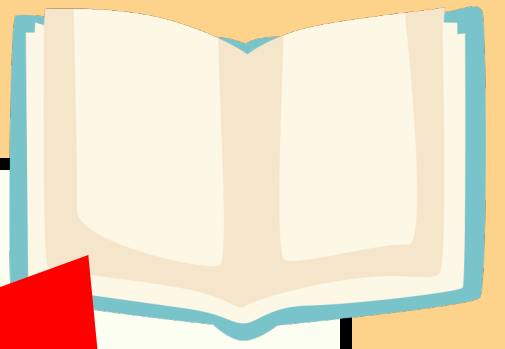
Description: those three noisy birds

Context: those three noisy coastal birds

Stop when the meaning is clear. More words are not always better.



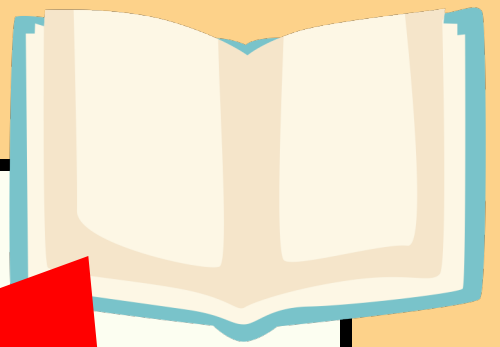

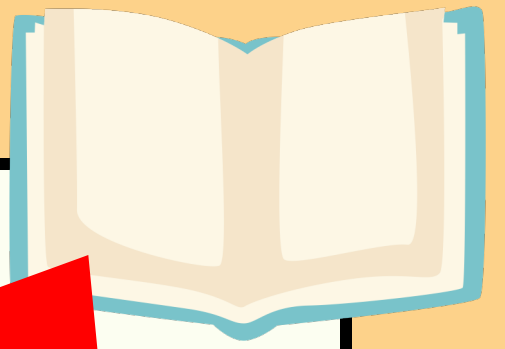

Noun Groups in Complex Sentences

A complex sentence joins an independent clause with a dependent clause.

Although the narrow forest path looked dark, two confident hikers continued.

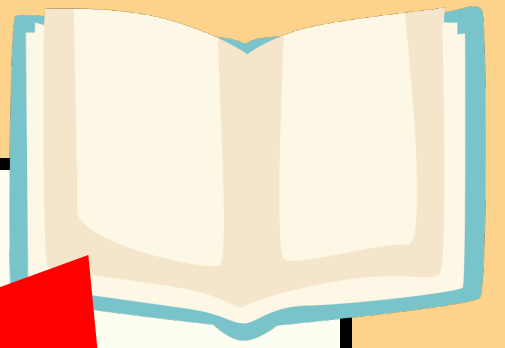
Dependent clause: Although the narrow forest path looked dark

Independent clause: two confident hikers continued

Precise noun groups make each clause clearer without making it crowded.
